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

# On your mark, get set for the Whidbey Island Marathon

It's time to start thinking about the Whidbey Island Marathon.

Registration is open and the Whidbey Island Marathon will be back April 23. Hundreds of runners will take part in either the full marathon, the half marathon, a 10K or a 5K race or even a kids 1K event. The marathon will once again shut down Deception Pass Bridge on State Route 20, as it gets underway from Bowman Bay at 7 a.m. that Sunday morning and follows its 26.2-mile route to Oak Harbor's Windjammer Park. All other races will begin and end at Windjammer Park.

"This year, we anticipate 1,500 participants," said Fizz Events' Jared Loranger, race director. "Registrations are up year over year and things finally feel like they're getting back to 'normal,' or a new normal anyway, and it feels like people are excited to come out for events again. This will also be the first year we're able to host Canadian participants again with travel restrictions being eased. We're excited!"

The Whidbey Island Marathon is a qualifier for the Boston Marathon and kicks off the Salish Sea Road Race Series, which includes the Capital City Marathon in May, the North Olympic Discovery Marathon in June, the Orca Half Marathon in September and the Royal Victoria Marathon in October. While all these events are unique in their own way, those who call Whidbey Island home know what makes the Whidbey Island Marathon special.

"This race is one of the most beautiful races you can participate in and the only race that closes the Deception Pass bridge," Loranger said. "You can't beat the views from all over the different courses."

It's an event runners come back for year after year, according to Loranger.

"They love the community feel," he said. "We have so many volunteers that come support the race along with the community cheering on participants that it feels like the community is behind all the runners."

In the past, people have traveled from all over the U.S. and even from other countries to participate. The pandemic years changed that a bit, but participants still make the trip to run the Whidbey Island Marathon.

"It's always neat to see how many people travel for the event and for a vacation to the Pacific Northwest," Loranger said. "Annually, over 65 percent of our participants are from off Whidbey Island, with the majority coming from Washington, but lots come from all over."

Another bonus of events like the Whidbey Island Marathon, said Loranger, is that it can encourage people to get involved in the sport of running, no matter what age they are or what stage they are at in their running journey.

"A marathon distance isn't for everyone and typically if you're getting into a run, it's not the distance you start at," he explained. "We promote offer-

ing a distance for everyone so the entire family can participate, all the way down to the little ones with the 1K kids run. It's a fun event that is truly an event for the whole family. And hopefully after you participate, you come back the next year and take on a longer distance!"

It's not unusual to see a lot of spectators, either, said Loranger.

"It takes a lot of time and investment to train for running races, so typically your family has been through those training days with you," he described. "It's not uncommon to see families lining the finish line waiting for their loved ones to come back. Kids make encouraging signs, people bring flowers to their finishers and everyone is there cheering on each of the finishers."

While the Whidbey Island Marathon just lasts a day (not counting the check in and expo the day before), there is a lot of work and planning that goes into putting an event like this together.

"Setting up and producing an event of this size is always challenging due to how many miles the races stretch throughout the island," said Loranger. "Working with so many different entities is challenging at times as well, but everyone is very used to the race at this point and looks forward to seeing all the different tourists that come to participate and visit the area. That makes it a fun challenge."

Registration is currently open for all races at runwhidbey.org, but those interested are able to sign up even as late as race day. The website also has details on pricing and route information to help answer runners' questions. Volunteers are also needed and registration for that is available on the website as well.

Loranger said he looks forward to Whidbey Island Marathon day every year.

"I enjoy seeing so many smiles as runners cross the finish line, no matter if it was their first time finishing a race or their 100th," he said. "It's always cool to see so many people realize their goals."



For 22 years, these Totem Pole Journeys have been visiting communities across this great nation touching hearts, raising awareness, bringing hope, solutions and solidarity to those in need. This year's journey is dedicated to supporting the San Carlos Apache, who are fighting to protect their sacred ceremonial grounds at Oak Flat, Ariz., from a proposed copper mine. ### **Muzzall Garners Nearly \$30 Million** for District Schools

The state senate unveiled its proposal for the 2023-25 Capital Budget earlier this week. Hailed by negotiators as a record investment for housing, state Sen. Ron Muzzall is proud to have secured nearly \$30 million for school districts who've struggled to get local resources for capital projects. Oak Harbor School District, whose local bond was recently rejected, is set to receive the lion's share of capital-related funds.

"Capital costs are significant burdens for our school districts and I'm proud to support these robust investments from the state," Muzzall said. "Oak Harbor has tried unsuccessfully with their local bonds, and I think taxpayers feel fatigued with those assessments. This mechanism of funding is a way to meet those needs without further burdening property owners in the district."







In the Senate's version of the state's construction budget, \$13.9 million would go toward the Oak Harbor Early Learning Center, which houses early learning programs for children ages 3-5 and other special education programs for the district's youngest learners. Another \$13.6 million is allocated to Crescent Harbor Elementary. Muzzall also fought to include funding for La Conner School District, which would receive just over \$1.5 million for its capital projects in the senate's

Muzzall points to the high level of funding as an opportunity for schools to receive further federal matching dollars to make capital improvements a reality. If the level of funding championed by Muzzall is maintained, the district could be eligible for an additional \$55.9 million for early learning and \$53.9 million for elementary schools.

"Thank you to Senator Muzzall for his continued efforts advocating on behalf of our students. Through your leadership, we have an opportunity to capture critical Department of Defense federal matching dollars to rebuild two aging schools on military installations that currently house more than 800 students (pre school - 12th grade) every day," said Oak Harbor Public Schools Superintendent Michelle Kuss-Cybula. "By approving Senate Bill 5324, you are investing in our children and the future of our community. Thank you for being a champion for all of our students."

The final capital budget still needs to be negotiated with the house of representatives and approved by both chambers. The house is expected to release its proposal March 27. Muzzall is committed to working with his house counterparts to maintain the strong education spending during negotiations.





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

# Foliage-filled fashions to highlight unique runway show

Now's the time to get tickets for the most unique fashion show to hit a runway on Whidbey Island since 2019.

The Center in Oak Harbor is holding its second Wearable Art Runway Show Saturday, April 22. Doors open at 6 p.m. at The Center, located at 51 SE Jerome Street. Tickets are \$60 per person and include the runway show and a catered dinner, and there will also be a "dessert dash." Proceeds benefit the Oak Harbor Senior Center Foundation, which provides support to maintain and grow programs at The Center. Tickets may be purchased online at ohscfoundation. org/events or in person or by phone at The

The first Wearable Art Runway Show was held at The Center in 2019. According to organizers, it was a big success.

"We were looking for a signature event, something that wasn't already happening, to bring people together, give people the opportunity to be creative and have a good time," said Liz Lange, senior services administrator for the City of Oak Harbor. "Man, was it a hit! We sold out the first year and we can't wait to do it again."

Because it's been a bit since the first runway show, Lange said in many ways it feels as though organizers are starting over again.

"We've been able to rearrange things a bit so we can sell 80 tickets," she said. "That's a good size. We're both worried and hopeful we'll outgrow our space and we'll have to move to a bigger venue in the future."

This year's theme for the juried runway show is foliage or Earth Day, since that is the day upon which the event falls. Ensembles must include foliage, either real, fake or something that represents the "essence" of foliage. They must also include repurposed materials and some sort of headpiece, such as a hat, mask or crown. The goal is to get artists – experienced or not – to have fun and let their creativity inspire their look. Artists can choose to model their own ensemble or have someone else model it. Multiple models per entry are also permitted.

"We're happy to find models, if needed," said Lange. "We're looking forward to our 'celebrity' models this year – our Miss Oak Harbor royalty are participating as models and helpers and

[Oak Harbor city councilor] Tara Hizon has volunteered to be one of the models."

There are currently about 12 registered entries from all over Whidbey Island, but organizers said they are always open to more.

"We are open for additional entries," said Lange. "We've got a strong lineup of ensembles so far. We really just want people to be creative and playful and use art in any media that can be worn. What we really want to focus on is repurposed materials.

"Also what's really neat is that we have people participating who are artists and have been doing it for a long time and others who don't consider themselves artists at all," she continued. "They all come up with the most beautiful ensembles. So we really encourage beginners, novices and advanced artists; this is something anyone can participate in."

Lange shared a story about repurposed materials found during a crafter's swap held a few weeks ago at the Oak Harbor Sno-Isle Library.

"We got a big piece of plain, beige material," she described. "We took it to our Monday afternoon art group at The Center, ran it down the length of a few tables and everyone started painting. It turned out so lovely. It's the work of multiple artists and it's covered in flowers and leaves. They turned a boring piece of plain fabric into a piece of art that's going to wrap around a person as they walk down the runway."

Another group Lange said she would love to get more involved with the wearable art show in the future is students.

"We want this to be a fun community event that will give young artists the opportunity to showcase their talent," she said.

Whether an artist who has submitted a design or an audience member, Lange promises something truly unique for everyone.

"It's a unique opportunity to come and watch, because most people haven't heard of a wearable art show," she said. "Usually an artist's medium features a canvas on a stand, now they are creating something wearable. Most art shows are in a gallery with the art hung on walls – these art pieces are walking down the





Those attending the runway show are encouraged to dress up in the spirit of the theme if they choose. They also get to vote for their favorite designs and prizes will be awarded in three categories – best use of the theme, most creative and best in show.

Lange said she is thankful for the community support the wearable art runway show has received so far, particularly from the OHSC Foundation board as well as from the city's arts commission. She said her hope is that events like this can help The Center reach out to the community even more.

"We have this vision of being a community without walls," she said. "I think a lot of times people think about us at The Center as just programs happening inside buildings, but we definitely extend beyond these walls. Especially now that the city has created a Parks and Recreation Department, it's kind of given us a broader ability to involve the community beyond our older adult age group. We want to let the community know we're excited and ready to provide opportunities for everyone in the community.

Snack foods can be categorized as comfort foods — and potato chips (or "crisps" as they're known across the pond) are no exception. Potato chips come in different flavors and cuts, including crinkle and kettle chips. While it's easy to pick up a bag at the store, why not whip up a fresh batch right at home? You will have complete control over the ingredients and enjoy the freshest chips around. Try this recipe for "Homemade Potato Chips" courtesy of home cook, and country living blogger Kathy from Beyond the Chicken Coop.

### **Homemade Potato Chips**

6 medium russet potatoes 2 tablespoons white vinegar

Water

- 1. Peel potatoes and place potato in a bowl filled with water.
- 2. Slice potatoes to 1/16 inch thick. Use a mandolin to get an even, consistent size. Immediately place sliced potatoes in another bowl filled with cold water and 2 tablespoons of white vinegar. Allow potatoes to soak for at least 1 hour.
- Drain potatoes and rinse with cold water. Leave potatoes in colander and allow all water to drain
- Place drained potatoes on a clean, dry kitchen towel. Pat lightly to remove any remain-
- 5. Fill pot with 2 inches of oil. Preheat oil to 380°F. Use a thermometer to test tempera-
- 6. Test oil temperature. Ideal temperature will vary from 370° to 380°F. Fry one or two slices in the oil and cook until they are nicely browned. If the potatoes brown quicker than 3 minutes, lower the temperature by 5 degrees.
- 7. Place one handful of sliced potatoes in the oil. Stir gently to prevent potatoes from sticking to each other. Cook until golden; 3 minutes.
- 8. Scoop out and place on a baking sheet lined with a baking rack.
- 9. 9. Sprinkle with salt immediately and repeat until all potatoes are cooked.
- 10. Tips: Soaking the potatoes helps remove excess starch and prevents the potatoes from sticking together. It also helps them fry up more crispy. Chips are best eaten the day they are made. Store in an airtight container for up to 2 days.






