# Whidbey offers several Veterans Day observances

Veterans Day is Saturday, making it a great day to participate in some of the activities taking place on Whidbey Island in honor of those who have served and are serving in our nation's Armed Forces. It only makes sense the island would pull out all the stops, since more than 13 percent of Island County residents are veterans, the highest population proportion in the state.

#### **VETERANS DAY PROGRAM**

The Navy League of the United States, Oak Harbor Council, will present its 20th annual Veterans Day program at 11 a.m. Saturday at Oak Harbor High School.

"Veterans Day is the one day a year we call attention to the ordinary people who have stepped forward to serve the nation," said George Saul, a member of Oak Harbor's Navy League. "It's a day of pride for those of us who have worn the uniform."

Featured at this year's program, which always takes place at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month to commemorate the signing

of the Armistice that ended World War I, will be the Oak Harbor High School band and choir, along with a Color Guard from the school's NJROTC program.

The featured speaker will be U.S. Navy Capt. J.T. Pianetta, Deputy Commodore, Patrol and Reconnaissance Wing TEN. Pianetta, who responded to questions from *Whidbey Weekly* via email, said he comes from a family with strong ties to the military, making the holiday a special one for him.

"Veterans Day to me holds special significance, since my father was also in the Navy, my brother is currently on active duty, my grandfather, uncle, and cousins also served," he shared.

"Why did I choose to serve? That's a complicated question but I'll keep it short," Pianetta continued. "My dad was a pilot. I remember going to airshows and growing up in that mindset, all I ever wanted to be was a pilot. The choice to serve was a different feeling, to be honest. My dad would talk about the times being part of something that he loved. The squadron, the friends, but the deep and unapologetic love of this country was always right in the front. That is what I learned and remembered the most. I can't speak to the reasons the other members of the family served, they all had their own, but I do know that we all served in different ways. Marine infantry, submarines, Army air corps and cavalry, naval aviation. Officer and enlisted."

Pianetta said he plans to discuss not only the sacrifices all veterans make during their service, but also the sacrifices made by those who support veterans – their family, friends and support networks, for example. Simply attending Saturday's program is another way to show support.

"Attendance in and of itself is a form of recognition and thanks, and I thank all in advance for taking time out of their day to show their respect," he said. "Time is one of the most precious things that we have, and to dedicate a couple hours to honor those who have served or continue to serve is one of the greatest ways we can express our thanks and respect."

Whidbey Island and the Oak Harbor community in particular are known for the support shown to the military and veterans, something that has not escaped Pianetta's notice.

"Whidbey island and the community that surrounds the area is different than every area I have served over the last 23 and-a-half years," he said. "The community is small and close knit. I have always felt welcome here, and I cannot say that about all the places I have served."

"Oak Harbor is special because we are a dynamic blend of active duty and veterans," noted Saul. "We know each other and interact with each other through our community clubs and our (grand)kids' events. Our common bond is our service to the country. We opted to raise our right hand and swore an oath to defend something bigger than ourselves. Just ordinary people committed to each other and to our country. Makes me proud to live here."

#### **VETERANS DAY PARADE**

After attending the Veterans Day program, everyone is invited to make their way to downtown Oak Harbor for the return of the Oak Harbor Main Street Association's Veterans Day Parade. The procession begins at 2 p.m. and will travel along SE Pioneer Way from Midway Blvd. to Ely Street. The event is being planned in conjunction with the Oak Harbor Chamber of Commerce and will take place rain or shine.

"We live in a Navy town and have lots of veterans that live here," said Margaret Livermore, executive director of OHMSA. "We feel it is important to show our support and thank the veterans for their service."

While it is too late to register to enter the parade, there will be plenty of participants, including Naval Air Station Whidbey Island Executive Officer, Cmdr. Joshua Overn, and several veterans organizations, such as Veterans of Foreign Wars, Brothers in Arms, Whidbey Island Veterans Resource Center and Patriot Guard Riders. Look for members of Oak Harbor High School's NJROTC program and Sea Cadets as well. Other participating organizations include the Oak Harbor Council of the Navy League, the PBY Memorial Foundation and Naval Air Museum, Daughters of the American Revolution, Guitars for Vets and many more local groups.

"We hope that the parade will show that the community cares and respects our veterans for their service," Livermore said, encouraging people to attend the first Veterans Day Parade since 2019. "Please come out and celebrate our veterans. Show them that we appreciate all they have done for us."

#### TAPS ACROSS AMERICA

For those unable to venture up to Oak Harbor

for the Veterans Day program and parade, there will be another commemoration of the day.

Taps Across America, a nationwide effort, will mark Veterans Day with the playing of "Taps" at 11 a.m. Saturday in front of the flagpole at 3604 Saratoga Road, Langley. Those interested in attending should arrive early.

This is the third year for this observance, which serves to remind all Americans of those military heroes who have fallen in defense of our freedom.

#### Virtual Town Hall to Discuss Island **County's Efforts to Bring Internet**

The Island County Broadband Action Team will host a virtual town hall at 5:00pm Thursday to share updates on the effort to bring robust, affordable broadband internet to all of Island County.

"More than \$20 million in federal, state and county investments has been awarded in Island County to expand broadband infrastructure for enhanced internet access," states Island County Commissioner Janet St. Clair, who is hosting the virtual town hall. "The Island County BAT has been working hard since 2019 to identify critical gaps in our community and build a plan to reach under-served and unserved areas of our islands."

The Island County Broadband Action Team is a collaborative of local governments, port districts, anchor institutions, schools, emergency response agencies, libraries, and an incredible group of internet service providers including Whidbey Telecom, Ziply, Comcast and Astound.

"The pandemic showed many of us the critical importance of internet access for our communities," Commissioner St. Clair said. "The educational and economic wellbeing of our communities, as well as access to remote healthcare, has become intrinsically intertwined with access to robust, affordable internet."

The internet service providers will each give information on their governmentfunded and private efforts to build a stronger broadband network in Island County. Guest speakers during the virtual town hall will also include leadership from Washington State Broadband Office and the National Telecommunications and Information Association. They will be discussing the future of broadband expansion in Washington state.

#### Statewide Draft Highway System Plan Available for Public Comment Through Dec. 18

Draft plan recommends highway investment strategy for next 20 years

A draft plan outlining investment recommendations for preserving, maintaining, improving and operating state highways for the next 20 years is now available for public review and comment. Comments on the draft Highway System Plan will be accepted through Monday, Dec. 18.

The Washington State Department of Transportation last published the plan in 2007. The new draft plan used scenario planning with extensive feedback to explore different investment alternatives and make the strongest recommendation.

#### Draft recommendations

Communities from around the state provided input to the draft Highway System Plan to reflect transportation priorities. These priorities form the core of WSDOT's recommendation to the legisla-

It proposes new revenue for state highways over the next 20 years be dedicated first to adequately funding preservation and maintenance. It also recommends remaining funds be balanced between safety and efficiency strategies and highway expansion projects at a 2:1 ratio. These recommendations would provide a resilient state highway system that is sound, safe and smart:

#### Sound

All bridges and highways remain open and are maintained in working condition.

#### Safe

Fewer crashes on state highways by providing safer travel spaces for all modes.

Healthier environment. Removal of fish passage barriers, fewer vehicle miles traveled, and decreased greenhouse gas emis-

More equitable outcomes. Agency investments and policy decisions that are equitable and inclusive.

More walking, bicycling, and rolling. Closure of most active transportation gaps on, next to, or across highways.

More travel options. Reduction of com-

### What should you know about RMDs?

You may spend decades contributing to various retirement accounts. But for some accounts, such as a traditional IRA and 401(k), you must start withdrawing funds at a certain point. What should you know about this requirement?

To begin with, the rules governing these withdrawals - technically called required minimum distributions, or RMDs - have changed recently. For many years, individuals had to begin taking their RMDs (which are based on the account balance and the IRS' life expectancy factor) when they turned 701/2. The original SECURE Act of 2019 raised this age to 72, and SECURE 2.0, passed in 2022, raised it again, to 73. (If you turned 73 in 2023, and you were 72 in 2022 when the RMD limit was still 72, you should have taken your first RMD for 2022 by April 1 of this year. You will then need to take your 2023 RMD by Dec. 31. And going forward, you'll also need to take your RMDs by the end of every year.)

Not all retirement accounts are subject to RMDs. They aren't required for a Roth IRA, and, starting in 2024, won't be required for a Roth 401(k) or 403(b) plan. But if your account does call for RMDs, you do need to take them, because if you don't, you could face tax penalties. Previously, this penalty was 50% of the amount you were supposed to have taken, but SECURE 2.0 reduced it to 25%.

When you take your RMDs, you need to be aware of a key issue: taxes. RMDs are taxed as ordinary income, and, as such, they could potentially bump you into a higher tax bracket and possibly even increase your Medicare premiums, which are determined by your modified adjusted gross income. Are there any ways you could possibly reduce an RMD-relat-

You might have some options. Here are two to consider:

Convert tax-deferred accounts to Roth IRA. You could convert some, or maybe all, of your tax-deferred retirement accounts to a Roth IRA. By doing so, you could lower your RMDs in the future - while adding funds to an account you're never required to touch. So, if you don't really need all the money to live on, you could include the remainder of the Roth IRA in your estate plans, providing an initially tax-free inheritance to your loved ones. However, converting a tax-deferred account to a Roth IRA will generate taxes in the year of conversion, so you'd need the money available to pay this tax bill.

• Donate RMDs to charity. In what's known as a qualified charitable distribution, you can move up to \$100,000 of your RMDs directly from a traditional IRA to a qualified charity, avoiding the taxes that might otherwise result if you took the RMDs yourself. After 2023, the \$100,000 limit will be indexed to inflation.

Of course, before you start either a Roth IRA conversion or a qualified charitable distribution, you will need to consult with your tax advisor, as both these moves have issues you must consider and may not be appropriate for your

But it's always a good idea to know as much as you can about the various aspects of RMDs they could play a big part in your retirement income strategy.



#### WHAT HAPPENED TO OUR WINTER BLACKMOUTH SEASON?

High winds, sideways rain, 45-degree temperatures, and frosty docks and boat ramps are normal weather patterns from November through April here in the Puget Sound. However, there are always a few days during this six-month period when the winds are calm, it is not raining and the boat ramps are frost free. These are the days that the winter blackmouth fishermen dream of.

Winter blackmouth are Chinook salmon, of which the majority remain in the Puget Sound and grow to adulthood. They are/ were a wonderful opportunity for the recreational fishermen to fish for and share with their families during the holiday season. They are not as plentiful as their migratory relatives but they are fantastic table fare just the same. I have fished the waters around Whidbey Island since 1995 and winter blackmouth had been part of my family's salmon fishing routine until three years ago, when the co-managers (tribal fisheries (Stillaguamish) and Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife) took this wonderful salmon fishing opportunity away from the 963,000 licensed Washington state anglers to accommodate the unproven variables of returning chinook salmon numbers the Stillaguamish tribe members reported to the WDFW. Here is a quick look at the history of Puget Sound blackmouth, according to a 1997 WDFW pamphlet:

"In the early 1960s the Dept of Fisheries set out to duplicate, by hatchery methods, an incubation time and release method where fish would [remain] local residents. If this could be duplicated, sport fishermen could have a year around salmon fishery in the Puget Sound.

"Frank Haw was selected for this job. His extensive testing revealed that by releasing the fish from a hatchery facility one year after the normal time, (15 months of age), that a majority of these fish lost their instinct to migrate great distances, if the food chain was available to them. At this time these fish were being raised in Percival Cove, a freshwater impoundment in Capitol Lake in Olympia.

"In the early 1980s, the Puget Sound tribes exercised the 1976 'Judge Boldt decision,' wanting their percentage of these Blackmouth. The department of fisheries was concerned that this would cripple the program, as the project production was reduced by about 50%. At about this same time, the west side of Olympia's population increased and with it, large amounts of contaminated water run-off found its way into Percival Cove.

"So the Blackmouth program was moved to net pens in the Squaxin Island area of Puget Sound. However the fish never seemed to stay in the sound and grow to adulthood like they used to. It took a few years to see that for the blackmouth program to be successful, the one year holding of the young Chinook had to be in freshwater, not saltwater."

This was the early and successful beginning of winter blackmouth. Today the responsibility of keeping the winter fishery alive has fallen on the surrounding hatcheries and other rearing programs. The resident winter fish experiment, if you want to call it that, is part of the overall Chinook salmon recovery effort and it works well; if it didn't, why would they close the fishery? From what I've seen in the realm of Washington state sport fishing, if a season like winter blackmouth gets taken away for whatever reason, it is extremely slow to return, if it does at all. Just look at innersound rockfish. it's been 16 years since we have been able to retain a rockfish in Marine Areas 5 through 13. Political treaty pressures, anti-hatchery activists, and in-state organizations like the "Wild Fish Conservancy," which files lawsuits against the State of Washington to stop realistic chinook recovery, need to be held responsible for the accelerated chinook salmon decline. If the yearly winter blackmouth seasons are allowed to continuously be taken away and not challenged and quickly restored by non-tribal, WDFW recreational fishing representatives, it will be used by the hatchery haters as a gateway to forever closures. It's obvious the anti-hatchery groups want you and me to eat adult farm raised salmon; in my opinion, healthy hatchery Pacific chinook salmon is a smart and achievable alternative to Pacific chinook salmon being left to the history books. Chinook numbers have been on the rise over the last couple of years thanks to the southern resident Orcas and I am hopeful these increases will in turn increase the Stillaguamish River chinook returns and satisfy the tribal members' needs and allow the winter blackmouth season to once again be open to all those that wait for those crisp, clear winter days to fish for salmon.

If you would like more information on how and why the blackmouth and other chinook seasons are decided, visit the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) website and focus your search on the North of Falcon (NOF) process. The NOF meetings begin early in the year; this is where our state's co-managers (tribal and non-tribal) come to the table and voice their concerns, discuss fisheries studies, and hopefully come to an agreement on what is best for the resource and not just one-sided judgments. I greatly miss winter blackmouth chinook fishing, and hope WDFW commissioners and recreational fishing representatives fight for and stand up for us. I always watch the emergency rule change section on the WDFW website in hopes the WDFW will give us the opportunity to fish during the winter months. If you are a year-round fisherman, give yourself some extra time for the cold, and continue to fish on!



Because my father didn't want to tell us anything, I was adamant about learning more about my Scandinavian heritage. I was always reading up, learning about it."

For Swenson Teel, membership in the Ester Moe Lodge of the Daughters of Norway has proved to be a joyful way to not only learn about her own history, but to make community

"The most fun being in the Daughters of Norway Lodge is enjoying our bond of friendship and sharing our heritage with our 'sister' members as well as sharing our resources with the community of Whidbey Island," she said. "I have the most amazing women on the board who come up with fantastic programs. I'm thrilled with what's happening with Daughters of Norway. We've added new members and there's a lot of excitement."

The group meets once a month to go over business and share a program and luncheon. Programs are varied and can include member travelogues, learning Scandinavian crafts, the history of Nordic explorers, the history of Nordic





knitting, learning about Norwegian ancestors who served as missionaries in China, and Norse Mythology.

"At each meeting a member tells the story of an heirloom or a narrative about their family heritage. This is called 'Vise Og Forklare,'" said Swenson Teel. "We also have a cooking class the day before the meeting. We have been learning how to cook Scandinavian food and then we

bring a taste to the meeting the next day. Some of the delicacies we have learned to make this vear include limpa bread, klubb (Norwegian potato dumpling), salmon cakes, nettle soup, kransekake (a festive dessert), farikal (Norwegian lamb and cabbage stew), saft (a berry drink) and fattigmanns (a Christmas cookie)."





#### Flag tradition continues

The grounds of Maple Leaf Cemetery in Oak Harbor were transformed into a Veterans memorial of sorts Saturday morning, as volunteers from the Whidbey Island Chapter of the Military Officers Association of America and the Oak Harbor High School NJROTC program placed American flags at the graves of veterans. Despite periodic rainfall and breezy conditions, more than 550 flags were placed in a little less than an hour.

WIC/MOAA has been coordinating the placement of flags for 13 years, not only at Maple Leaf Cemetery but also at Sunnyside Cemetery in Coupeville, Bayview Cemetery in Langley and two small heritage cemeteries

This year WIC/MOAA member JR Russell brought grandsons Joey and Leo along with him to share the experience. Russell said he seeks out the grave of his fellow sailor, U.S. Navy Cmdr. Howard "Bud" White, each year to place a flag in his honor. This year he regaled his grandsons with stories of White's dedication to the Navy's EA-6B Prowler program.

By the time volunteers finished their work, Maple Leaf Cemetery was awash in a sea of red, white and blue tributes, a vivid, patriotic memorial to those who served their country during their lifetime. The flags will remain in place at least through Veterans Day.

#### **EASY SALMON CAKES (Serves 4)**

- 1 pound canned salmon, flaked 1/2 cup gluten-free bread crumbs
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
- 1. Preheat the oven to 375 F. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper and set
- 2. In a large bowl, mix the salmon and bread
- 3. In a small bowl, whisk together the egg, mustard, dill, salt, and pepper. Fold this into the salmon and bread crumbs.
- 4. Form the salmon mixture into 4 patties and place them on the prepared baking sheet.
- 5. Bake for 5 minutes, flip, and bake for 5 minutes more, until the patties are golden. Garnish with fresh dill and lemon.





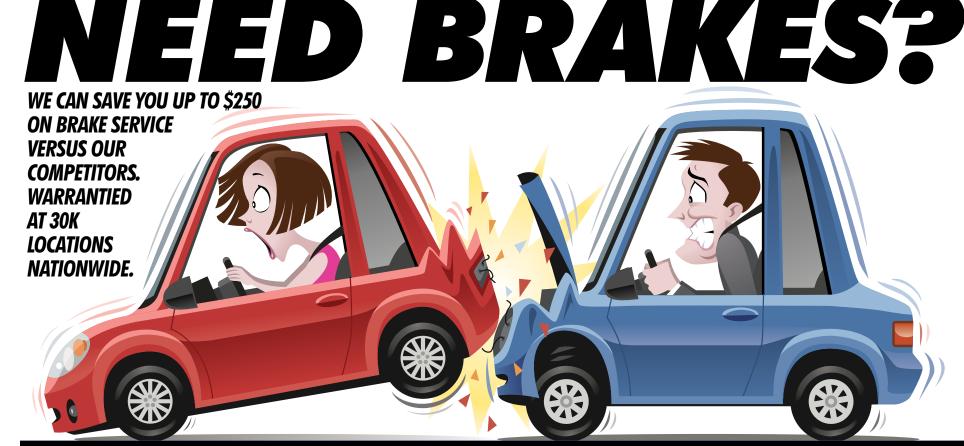
